# October is National Pedestrian Safety Month



Poor guy is depressed just thinking about it.

**Unfortunately, in 2021 alone there were 7,388 pedestrians killed in traffic crashes, a 12.5 - percent increase from the 6,565 pedestrian fatalities in 2020. This is the highest since 1981 when 7,837 pedestrians died in traffic crashes.**



**In 2021 there were an estimated 60,577 pedestrians injured in traffic crashes, an 11-percent increase from 54,771 pedestrians injured in 2020.**

**On average, a pedestrian was killed every 71 minutes and injured every 9 minutes in traffic crashes in 2021.**



Farley had to seek out some support to take in those tragic numbers.

**Unplug**  
Don't be a  
distracted walker.



**Make eye  
contact**

until traffic stops.



**Be bright**  
Wear reflective  
clothing at night.



**Never Jaywalk**

**Stay Alert**  
All the way across  
the intersection.



**Watch for  
turning**  
Vehicles  
of all kinds.

# Safer Speeds Save Lives

Risk to pedestrians increases as driver speed increases.

13%

of pedestrians will die or suffer a severe injury if hit by a vehicle at **20mph**

40%

of pedestrians will die or suffer a severe injury if hit by a vehicle at **30mph**

73%

of pedestrians will die or suffer a severe injury if hit by a vehicle at **40mph**



More than 1/3  
of all pedestrian traffic  
fatalities involve alcohol
